


The tour starts and finishes at Low Wood Bay Resort & Spa, Lake Windermere

Transport

Travelling by car: From the M6, take exit 36 and head north on A590 for approx. 187 miles and then continue north on A591 for approx. 18 miles.

Travelling by train: The nearest train station to Low Wood Bay Resort & Spa is Windermere station, which is approximately 1.8 miles away. From Windermere station, you can take the 599 bus directly to the hotel.

Check-in and departure from the hotel

On the day of arrival, you will be able to check-in at the hotel from 15.00, and the tour manager will meet you at the welcome reception.

Blackwell - The Arts & Crafts House

Blackwell is a Grade I listed historic house and museum near Bowness-on-Windermere in the English Lake District. It is considered one of the finest surviving examples of Arts & Crafts architecture in the UK, designed by the acclaimed architect Mackay Hugh Baillie Scott. Blackwell was built between 1898 and 1900 as a holiday home for the wealthy Manchester brewer Sir Edward Holt and his family. The house's design emphasizes craftsmanship, simplicity, and functionality, key tenets of the Arts & Crafts movement championed by figures like John Ruskin and William Morris. The house has survived with nearly all of its original decorative features intact, allowing visitors to experience the total immersion of the Arts & Crafts style.

Broad Leys

Broad Leys is also a Grade I listed Arts & Crafts house located on the shores of Lake Windermere in the English Lake District. Built in 1899 for Arthur Currer Briggs, a wealthy colliery owner, it is a masterpiece designed by the influential architect C.F.A. Voysey. Since 1950, it has been the clubhouse and home of the Windermere Motor Boat Racing Club. Broad Leys showcases many of Voysey's signature features, including a steeply pitched roof, rough-cast white walls, and a distinctive double-height curved bay window overlooking the lake.

Jesus Church in Troutbeck

The church in the village of Troutbeck in the Lake District is a historic Anglican parish church with significant Arts and Crafts connections. A Grade II* listed building, it is renowned for its stained-glass windows designed by prominent artists of the Arts and Crafts and Pre-Raphaelite movements. The church's most notable Arts and Crafts feature is the large east window, installed in 1873. It was primarily designed by Edward Burne-Jones and made by William Morris & Co. It depicts scenes from the life of Jesus. Ford Madox Brown is also credited with assisting on the design.

Levans Hall

Levans Hall is an Elizabethan mansion and a Grade I listed historic house in Cumbria, England, renowned for its interiors and the world's oldest topiary gardens. The hall showcases fine wood panelling, ornate plasterwork, and a collection of Jacobean furniture. Notable paintings by artists like Rubens, Lely, and Cuyp adorn the walls. The house displays historical items such as early English patchwork, Wellingtoniana, and Cordova leather wall coverings. The mansion was built around a 13th-century medieval Pele tower.

Abbot Hall

Abbot Hall is a Grade I listed Georgian villa on the banks of the River Kent in Kendal, Cumbria, that operates as an art gallery. Managed by the Lakeland Arts Trust, it houses an exceptional collection of historic and contemporary art. The gallery reopened in May 2023 after extensive renovation and showcases a variety of art from the 18th to the 21st century, with a strong focus on British art and landscape. Highlights include:

- Historic art: The collection includes works by renowned artists such as J.M.W. Turner, John Ruskin, and the Cumbrian-born portrait painter George Romney.
- Modern British art: It features works from prominent artists like Lucian Freud, Bridget Riley, Barbara Hepworth, and David Hockney.
- Contemporary art: The gallery continues to acquire contemporary pieces and features artists like Charmaine Watkiss.

St James' Church in Staveley

St James' Church in Staveley, Cumbria, is a Grade II listed parish church known for its significant Arts & Crafts features, most notably a stained-glass east window by Edward Burne-Jones and William Morris. However, as of December 2025, the church building is currently closed to visitors due to structural issues with its spire and lychgate. The aast window is the church's most famous feature, designed by Sir Edward Burne-Jones and made by William Morris & Co. in 1878. It depicts the Crucifixion and the Ascension against a starry blue background. One of the angels from the window was featured on a Royal Mail Christmas stamp in 2009. The church's chancel features wood carvings that reflect the Arts & Crafts movement and the Silverwork in the church was created by the respected Keswick School of Industrial Art.

Brantwood & Ruskin Museum

In Coniston, Cumbria, Brantwood is the historic home of Victorian polymath John Ruskin, now a museum dedicated to his life and work. The Ruskin Museum, also in Coniston, is a separate institution that tells the "Story of Coniston" and showcases more of Ruskin's collections.

Brantwood was John Ruskin's home for the last 28 years of his life and is located on the eastern shore of Coniston Water. It functions as a museum and vibrant arts centre with several features. The house remains filled with Ruskin's personal treasures, art, and furniture, offering insight into his daily life. Changing exhibitions of both historic and contemporary art are held in the Blue Gallery and the Severn Studio Gallery. The estate includes 250 acres of gardens and woodlands with unique spaces created by Ruskin, including the mythological "Zig-Zaggy" garden.

The Ruskin Museum was founded in 1901 by Ruskin's secretary, W. G. Collingwood, as a memorial to Ruskin. It covers a broader local history and includes exhibits showcasing Ruskin's own watercolours, drawings, and manuscripts, highlighting his artistic and philosophical ideas. A dedicated wing houses the restored Bluebird K7, the jet-powered hydroplane in which Donald Campbell tragically died in 1967. This exhibit includes the restored craft and other memorabilia. The museum covers Coniston's industrial past, including copper and slate mining, as well as exhibits on local geology, lace making, and writer Arthur Ransome.



Professor Anne Anderson

With a first degree in archaeology and a PhD in English, Anne was a senior lecturer in Art and Design History at Southampton Solent University for 14 years from 1993 to 2007. She specializes in the Aesthetic Movement, Arts and Crafts, Art Nouveau and Modernism. She has published several books, including The Perseus Series, which accompanied the Edward Burne-Jones exhibition held at Tate Britain (2018), and Art Nouveau Architecture (2020). She has also published over 50 articles in respected academic journals.

Anne has curated four national exhibitions, mostly recently Beyond the Brotherhood The Pre-Raphaelite Legacy (2019-20). American fellowships held include the Huntington Library, CA and the American Antiquarian Society, MA. She has lectured for The Arts Society, The Art Fund, the V&A Learning Academy, the National Trust and Christies'. Her career as an international speaker has taken her all over the world, including Spain, Germany, New Zealand, Canada and the USA. She undertook her sixth lecture tour for Arts National Australia in 2024. She has also lectured on several cruise ships, Swan Hellenic's Minerva, the Spirit of Adventure and the Hebridean.

Anne has received a rapturous response from our travellers at the UK lectures and tours, as well as a host of tours overseas, and her knowledge, wit and enthusiasm bring her beloved subjects to life in whatever location she finds them.



Tour manager - Your tour manager will be on hand throughout the tour to ensure that everything operates according to plan.
