




The tour starts and finishes at The Feathers Hotel, Ludlow

Transport

Travelling by car: The hotel is situated one mile from the A49.

Travelling by rail: The nearest station is Ludlow train station - a five-minute walk.



The Feathers Hotel, Ludlow

The Feathers Hotel is a Grade I listed building with its authentic half-timbered façade and considered landmark building in the heart of beautiful Ludlow. Recently renovated and refurbished facilities here include bar, lounge, restaurant and comfortable bedrooms with all modern amenities including en-suite bathroom, TV, telephone, wifi and tea/coffee making facilities.

Car parking: Parking is available at the Feathers Hotel private car park subject to availability and is chargeable at £7.50 per night, payable directly to the hotel. Alternatively, parking may be found on the surrounding streets and Ludlow's Galdeford Pay and Display car park which is approximately three minutes away.

Check-in and departure from the hotel

On the day of arrival, you will be able to check-in at the hotel from 15.00, and the tour manager will meet you in the evening at the welcome reception.

Ludlow

Ludlow is a thriving medieval market town and an architectural gem. The historic town centre is situated on a cliff above the River Teme and is surrounded by the beautiful countryside of south Shropshire and the Welsh Marches – the England-Wales borderlands. We enjoy a guided walking tour of this ancient town with Julian and Elizabeth, including St Laurence's Church and Ludlow Castle

Stokesay Castle

Stokesay Castle is one of the finest fortified manor houses in England. Standing in a peaceful Shropshire valley near the Welsh border, Stokesay has survived remarkably intact since a leading wool merchant, Laurence of Ludlow, built it in the late 13th century. His fortified manor house was both comfortable and impressive, designed as a statement of his wealth and power. Today, barely touched by the passage of years, the castle offers a unique insight into life in medieval England.

Clun Castle

Clun Castle sits high on a natural rocky mound in a loop of the river Clun, on the edge of the small, picturesque town of the same name. In stark contrast to the lavishness of Stokesay, just ruins and earthworks remain of this Welsh border castle. Founded shortly after the Norman Conquest to demonstrate the authority of the English monarchy over this part of the border region, the castle and the nearby settlement prospered in the 13th century thanks to the management of the Fitzalan family, but suffered a number of attacks from across the Welsh border. It was used as a hunting lodge in the 14th century, but was increasingly neglected, and by 1539 the castle was reported as ruinous but its colourful history will be brought to your life by your hosts.

Croft Castle is more about comfort than defence. Situated on the English-Welsh border, Croft is a castellated 17th century manor house and home to the Croft family to this day. Much Wenlock and Priory

Our visit to beautiful Much Wenlock and its 12th century priory includes a guided walk. The tranquil ruins of Wenlock Priory stand in a picturesque setting on the fringe of Much Wenlock. An Anglo-Saxon monastery was founded here in about 680 by King Merewalh of Mercia, whose abbess daughter Milburge was hailed as a saint. Her relics were miraculously re-discovered here in 1101, attracting both pilgrims and prosperity to the priory. Much Wenlock was also the home of Dr William Penny Brookes (1809-95), originator of the still-continuing Wenlock Olympian Games, a major inspiration for the modern International Olympics. St Mary Magdalene

This large, dignified church stands in open countryside on the site of the ferocious Battle of Shrewsbury, which took place in 1403. Thousands of soldiers are thought to have died in the fray, and the church remains a quiet, some would say melancholic, memorial to the 1,600 people who were said to have been buried there. A statue of Henry IV, who defeated Henry Hotspur Percy in the battle, stands on the outside east wall. On the roof beams inside are representations of the shields of the knights who fought with Henry IV. A service is still held each year in July to commemorate the anniversary of the battle. Battlefield

Today Battlefield 1403 is an exhibition and bustling farm shop but over 600 years ago this was the site of one the bloodiest battles fought on British soil. The visitor centre highlights how the battle, fought between Henry IV and the rebellious Percy family, laid the foundations of the War of the Roses and honed the young Prince Henry's skills, which would later lead him to victory over the French army at the Battle of Agincourt. Haughmond Abbey

Over the course of the 12th century, a small religious community at Haughmond was transformed into a great Augustinian monastery, where a community of canons lived with their servants. These priest-monks lived apart from ordinary society, but they also gave food and shelter to the sick and poor, and supported a local nunnery. Wealthy benefactors helped Haughmond become one of the finest medieval abbeys in Shropshire. After the abbey's closure in 1539, parts of its buildings were converted into a Tudor mansion, and later the ruined monastery became a feature of the landscape garden of nearby Sundorne House.

Julian Humphrys

She is also the author of a biography of Margaret Beaufort and four of Henry VIII's wives, amongst other titles. She regularly writes for magazines, including BBC History magazine, All About History, History Revealed and Who Do You Think You Are? magazine.

Elizabeth frequently appears on television, including Danny Dyer's Right Royal Family, Digging up Britain's Past and Secrets of Great British Castles.

O Practical Information

Tour manager - Your tour manager will be on hand throughout the tour to ensure that everything operates according to plan.
