
The tour starts and finishes at the Parsonage Hotel and Spa, Escrick.

Transport

If you are travelling by **car**: From the M1, exit at Junction 32. Use the left two lanes to the M18 exit to Hull/Doncaster/ Rotherham. Continue on M18 for 26 miles and then merge onto the M62. At Junction 36, take A614 exit to Goole and follow signs for A645, A1041, A63 and A19 going over a series of nine roundabouts. As you approach the last roundabout to stay on A19, take the first exit, turn left and left again and you will see the hotel on your right.

Parking is provided at the hotel, complimentary for Travel Editions clients. The Parsonage Hotel and Spa can also offer an electric car charging facility at £30.00 for a 6/8hr overnight charge.

If you are travelling by **train**: York railway station is the closest to the hotel. It is a 15 minute taxi journey which costs approximately £20.



The Parsonage Hotel and Spa

The Parsonage Hotel and Spa is set in 6 acres of beautiful formal gardens and woodland, only a short drive from the historic city of York.

Dining

Sandal Castle

Sandal Castle was the site of royal intrigue and even the setting for a scene in one of William Shakespeare's plays. The castle was built in the early 12th century by William, second Earl Warenne, after receiving the manor of Wakefield from Henry I for his support at the battle of Tinchebrai in 1106. It was a timber motte and bailey castle, rebuilt over the course of the 13th century in stone. After the Warenne family died out without any legitimate children in 1347, the castle eventually came into the hands of the Dukes of York.

Royal Armouries Museum, Leeds

The Royal Armouries is the United Kingdom's national collection of arms and armour. Once an important part of England's military organization, it became the United Kingdom's oldest museum, and one of the oldest museums in the world. [1][2] It is also one of the largest collections of arms and armour in the world, comprising the UK's National Collection of Arms and Armour, National Artillery Collection, and National Firearms Collection.

Towton Battlefield (Saxton)

The battlefield of Towton sits within a beautiful and historic landscape. The Battle of Towton took place on 29 March 1461 during the Wars of the Roses, near Towton in North Yorkshire, and "has the dubious distinction of being probably the largest and bloodiest battle on English soil". Fought for ten hours between an estimated 50,000 soldiers in a snowstorm on Palm Sunday, the Yorkist army achieved a decisive victory over their Lancastrian opponents. As a result, Edward IV deposed the Lancastrian Henry VI and secured the English throne.

The Battle of Towton

St Mary's Church, Lead

Since being rescued by a group of walkers in 1931, St Mary's has been known as the Ramblers' Church. The repairs made then are recorded on the back of the church door.

The church stands alone in the middle of a field filled with the bumps and furrows of earthworks that indicate the site of a medieval manor house, for which St Mary's was probably originally the chapel.

Despite its awesome history, St Mary's is a peaceful place. The tiny rectangular building is very simple. It was probably built by the Tyas family, whose massive grave slabs are set into the floor. Carved with heraldic symbols and inscriptions, and dating from the thirteenth century, they are an important and interesting collection. Later additions were made in the eighteenth century, with a rustic pulpit, clerk's pew, reading desk and painted texts.

York Minster

York's cathedral church is one of the finest medieval buildings in Europe.

The Minster is also known as St Peter's, its full name being the 'Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of St Peter in York. The site of the magnificent medieval building has always been an important one for the city.

The remains of the Basilica, the ceremonial centre of the Roman fortress, have been found beneath the Minster building. The first Christian church on the site has been dated to 627 and the first Archbishop of York was recognised by the Pope in 732. The present Gothic-style church was designed to be the greatest cathedral in the kingdom. It was built over 250 years, between 1220 and 1472.

Middleham Castle

Best known as one of the childhood homes of Richard III, Middleham Castle dominates the North Yorkshire town of Middleham. From the core of its Norman great tower, one of the largest in the country, the castle developed under the powerful Nevilles into a residence worthy of a family who dominated English affairs for over two centuries. Richard, Duke of Gloucester (later Richard III) spent his youth at Middleham and it became one of his royal homes.
